ATHLETIC TRAINING (AT)

This health care profession has similar techniques used by physical therapists in the areas of treatment and rehabilitation. You will learn patient interactions and evaluation methods as an AT major that will be helpful as you move to the DPT.

BIOLOGY OR CHEMISTRY

The importance of the basic sciences needed to succeed in DPT is evident in the fact that many of the prerequisites for the DPT, as well as four of the courses required during the first year, are a part of the biology or chemistry programs.

PSYCHOLOGY



COOL CLASSES

ADVANCED SPECIALTY — You'll study theory, research, and clinical practice in sports or women's health.

ORTHOTICS & PROSTHETICS IN PT — This course involves examination and intervention for patients with orthotic and prosthetic needs as well as construction and application of biomedical devices.

PEDIATRIC SPECIALTY — This class is designed for students who are interested in working with children's rehabilitation and recovery.

YOUR DPT EXPERIENCE

This program is an accelerated 3+3 program in which you can finish your undergraduate and Doctor of Physical Therapy degree in six years. Clarke has a 10-table, medical school-quality cadaver lab that gives students an opportunity to learn with the best resources.

The DPT program features a national network of clinical education sites at some of the top clinics and medical centers in the country. Each student is required to do 40 weeks of internship work. You'll gain early exposure to patients with Clarke's pro-bono "practicum" clinic.
